SUBJECT: Financial Audit of USAID Resources Managed by Catholic Medical Mission Board Zambia Under Cooperative Agreement 72061120CA00008, October 1, 2020, to September 30, 2021 (Report No. 4-611-22-079-R)

This memorandum transmits the final audit report on USAID resources managed by Catholic Medical Mission Board Zambia (CMMB-Z) under the Empowered Children and Adolescents Program I. CMMB-Z contracted with the independent audit firm Ernst & Young, Lusaka, Zambia to conduct the audit. The audit firm stated that it performed its audit in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards. However, it did not have an external peer review and a continuing professional education program that fully satisfy the standards' requirements. The audit firm is responsible for the enclosed report and the conclusions expressed in it. We do not express an opinion on CMMB-Z's schedule of expenditures of USAID awards; the effectiveness of its internal control; or its compliance with the award, laws, and regulations.¹

The audit objectives were to (1) express an opinion on whether the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards for the period audited, was presented fairly, in all material respects; (2) evaluate the CMMB-Z's internal controls; and (3) determine whether CMMB-Z complied with award terms and applicable laws and regulations.

To answer the audit objectives, Ernst & Young (1) audited the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards for the award including the budgeted amounts by category and major items and the revenues received from USAID for the period covered by the audit and the costs reported by CMMB-Z as incurred from October 1, 2020, to September 30, 2021; (2) evaluated the control environment, the adequacy of the accounting systems, and control procedures that pertain to CMMB-Z's ability to report financial data consistent with the assertions embodied in each account of the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards; and (3) identified the award terms and pertinent laws and regulations and determined which of those, if not observed, could

have a direct and material effect on the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards. CMMB-Z reported expenditures of \$3,760,760 in USAID funds during the audited period.

The audit firm concluded the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards presented fairly, in all material respects, program revenues and costs incurred under the award for the period audited. The audit firm identified \$1,677 in total ineligible questioned costs; no material weaknesses in internal control; and two instances of material noncompliance specifically related to the questioned costs identified. Since the questioned costs did not meet the OIG's established threshold of \$25,000 for making a recommendation, we are not making a recommendation. Nevertheless, we suggest that USAID/Zambia determine the allowability of the \$1,677 in questioned costs and recover any amount determined to be unallowable.

Accordingly, we are not making any recommendations.

During our desk review, we noted several areas for improvement which the audit firm should address in future audit reports. We presented these areas in a memo to the controller, dated August 2, 2022.
