SUBJECT: Financial Audit of USAID Resources Managed by Health Systems Consult Ltd. in Nigeria Under Cooperative Agreement 72062022CA00003, March 10 to December 31, 2022 (Report No. 4-620-24-005-R)

This memorandum transmits the final audit report on USAID resources managed by Health Systems Consult Ltd. (HSCL) under the Accelerating Control of the HIV Epidemic in Nigeria. HSCL contracted with the independent audit firm Kunle Egbeleke & Co., Abuja, Nigeria to conduct the audit. The audit firm stated that it performed its audit in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards. However, it did not have an external peer review or a continuing professional education program that fully satisfy the standards' requirements. The audit firm is responsible for the enclosed report and the conclusions expressed in it. We do not express an opinion on HSCL's schedule of expenditures of USAID awards; the effectiveness of its internal control; or its compliance with the award, laws, and regulations.¹

The audit objectives were to (1) express an opinion on whether the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards for the period audited, was presented fairly, in all material respects; (2) evaluate HSCL's internal controls; (3) determine whether HSCL complied with award terms and applicable laws and regulations; (4) review the indirect cost rate, or determine that the review of the indirect cost rate was not applicable; and (5) review the implementation status of the prior period recommendations.

To answer the audit objectives Kunle Egbeleke & Co, (1) audited the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards including the budgeted amounts by category and major items and the revenues received from USAID for the period covered by the audit and the costs reported by HSCL as incurred from March 10 to December 31, 2022; (2) evaluated the control environment, the adequacy of the accounting systems, and control procedures that pertain to HSCL's ability to report financial data consistent with the assertions embodied in each account of the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards; (3) identified the award terms and pertinent

laws and regulations and determined which of those, if not observed, could have a direct and material effect on the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards; (4) determined that the review of the indirect cost rate was not applicable; and (5) determined that there were no prior period recommendations to be followed up. HSCL reported expenditures of \$3,895,204 in USAID funds during the audited period.

The audit firm concluded the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards presented fairly, in all material respects, program revenues and costs incurred under the award for the period audited. The audit firm identified \$987 in ineligible questioned costs; no material weaknesses in internal control; and one instance of material noncompliance relating the questioned cost. Since the questioned costs did not meet the OIG's established threshold of \$25,000 for making a recommendation, we are not making a recommendation. Nevertheless, we suggest that USAID/Nigeria determine the allowability of the \$987 in questioned costs and recover any amount determined to be unallowable. Since one instance of material noncompliance relates to the questioned costs, we will not be making a recommendation for it. In addition, although we are not making a recommendation for significant deficiencies noted in the report, we suggest that mission determine if the recipient addressed the issues noted. The audit firm issued a management letter.

Accordingly, we are not making any recommendations.

During our desk review, we noted several areas for improvement which the audit firm should address in future audit reports. We presented these areas in a memo to the controller, dated October 19, 2023.

OIG does not routinely distribute independent public accounting reports beyond the immediate addressees because a high percentage of these reports contain information restricted from release under the Trade Secrets Act, 18 U.S.C. 1905 and Freedom of Information Act Exemption Four, 5 U.S.C. 552(b)(4) ("commercial or financial information obtained from a person that is privileged or confidential"). In addition, USAID OIG has determined that this transmittal memo and the enclosed report are not subject to notification and reporting requirements under Section 5274 of the National Defense Authorization Act.³
